Содержание

Введение

Методические рекомендации состоят из 22 разделов, включающих по 1-2 главе книги. В каждом разделе имеются лексические упражнения на поисковое чтение и закрепление новой лексики, грамматические упражнения, цель которых выработать у студентов практические навыки употребления новых грамматических конструкций и оборотов. Упражнения на понимание содержания представлены в виде утверждений для согласия или опровержения, а также блока вопросов по тексту для обсуждения.

Упражнения способствуют развитию навыков устной и письменной речи у студентов, усвоению новой лексики, более глубокому осмыслению прочитанного.
